

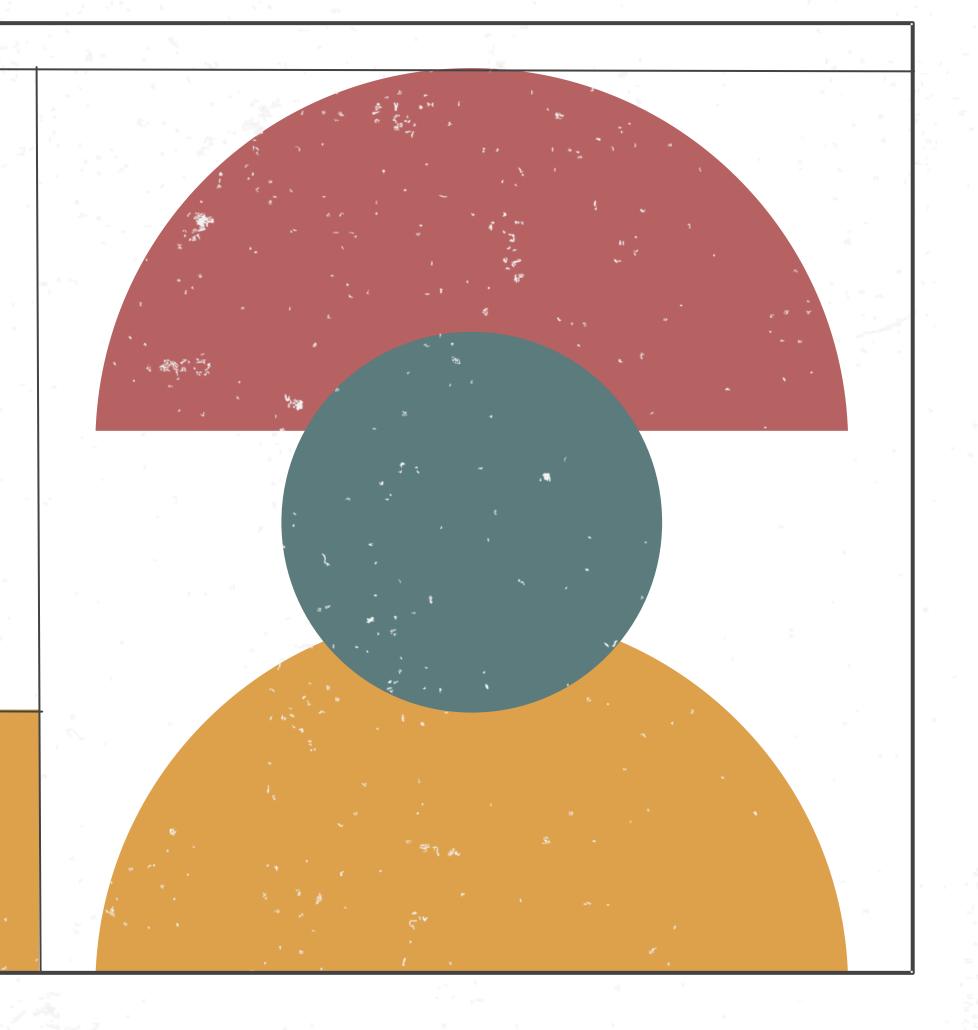

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Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD) is a diagnostic term used to describe impacts on the brain and body of individuals prenatally exposed to alcohol. FASD is a lifelong disability. Individuals with FASD will experience some degree of challenges in their daily living, and need support with motor skills, physical health, learning, memory, attention, communication, emotional regulation, and social skills to reach their full potential. Each individual with FASD is unique and has areas of both strengths and challenges.

Determining Prevalence is Complex

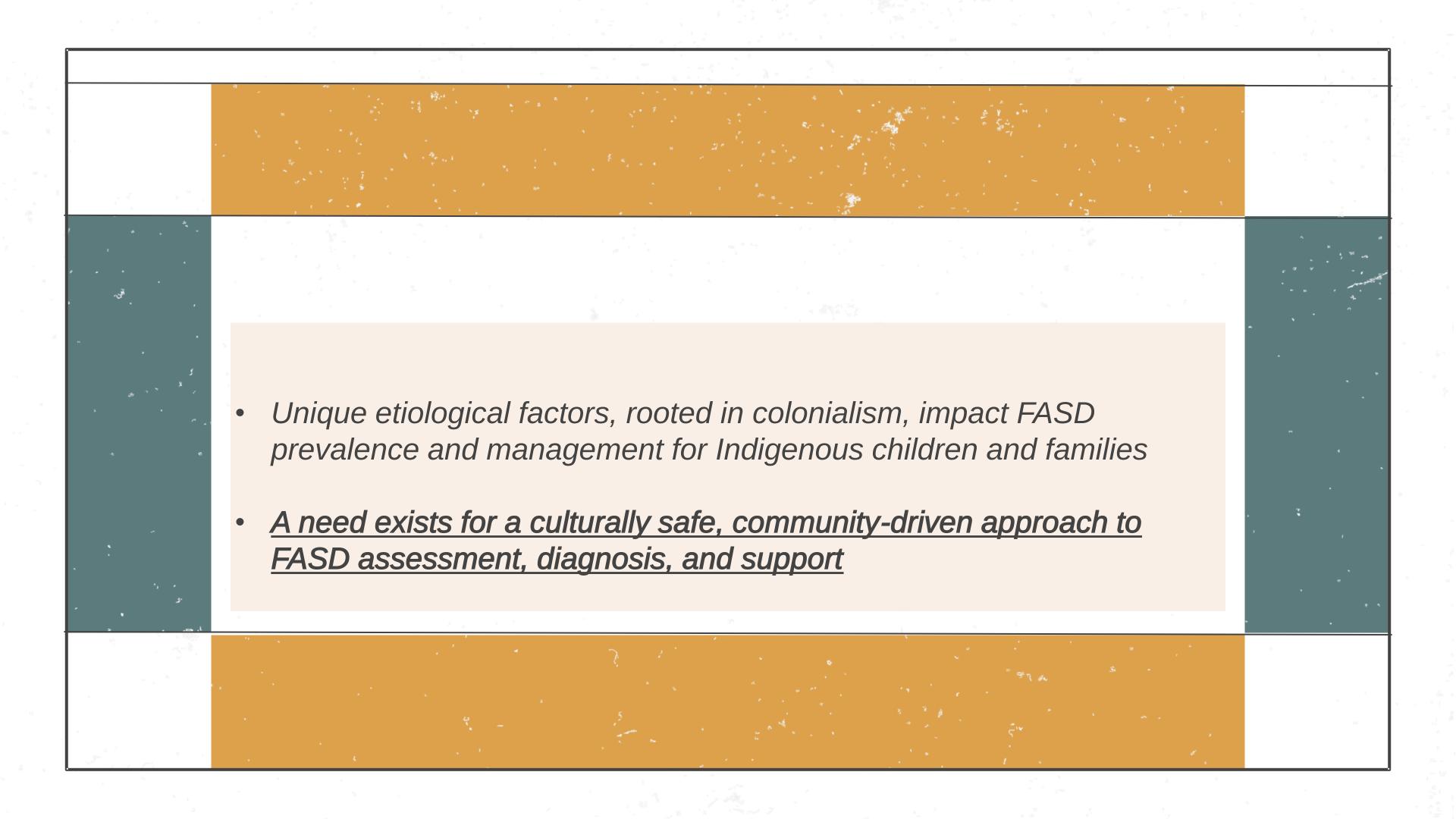
- Many researchers reiterate the message that FASD prevalence is elevated among Indigenous peoples; this is problematic
 - Limitations of FASD prevalence research
 - Absence of obvious physical indicators³
 - Significant variability in symptoms³
 - Delayed emergence of full symptoms
 - Lack of reliable biomarkers³
 - No universal definition⁴
 - Time-consuming and costly to diagnose⁵
 - Under-reporting due to stigma, shame,
 blame⁶

Indigenous Peoples

- Many researchers reiterate the message that FASD prevalence is elevated among Indigenous peoples; this is problematic
 - Limitations of FASD prevalence research
 - Oversurveillance
 - Referral bias
 - Specific populations and regions, small sample sizes
 - Pan-Indigenous representation
 - Contextualizing within colonialism
 - Residential school system
 - Sixties and millenium scoops
 - Violence against Indigenous women and girls

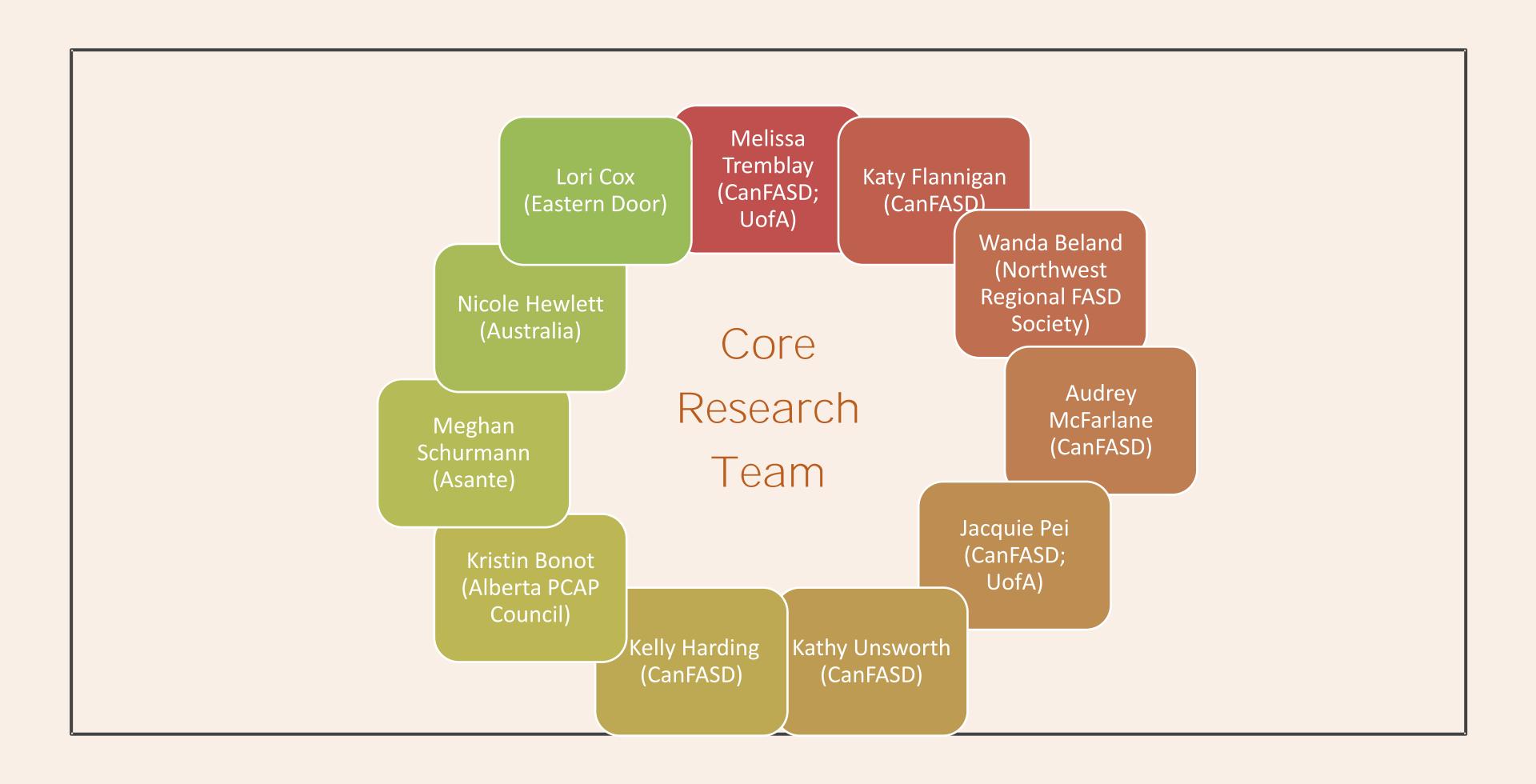

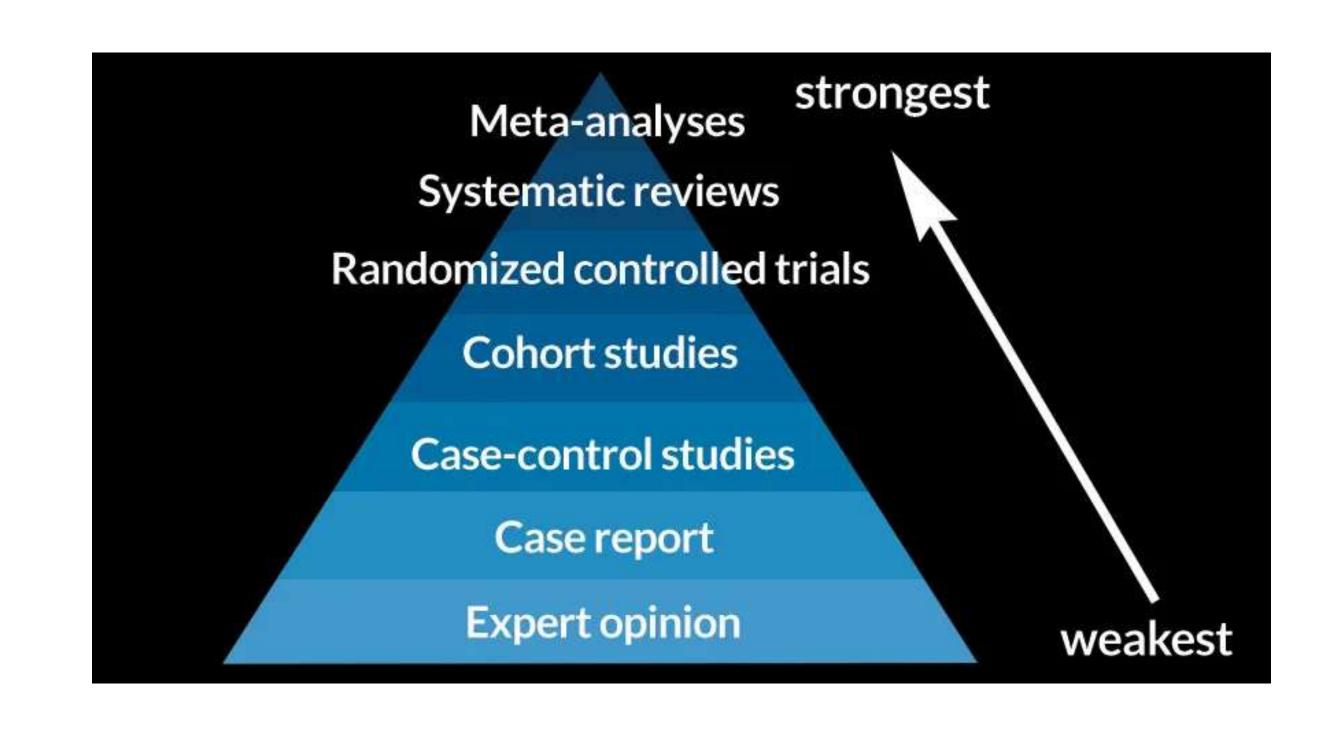
- Strategic catalyst grant

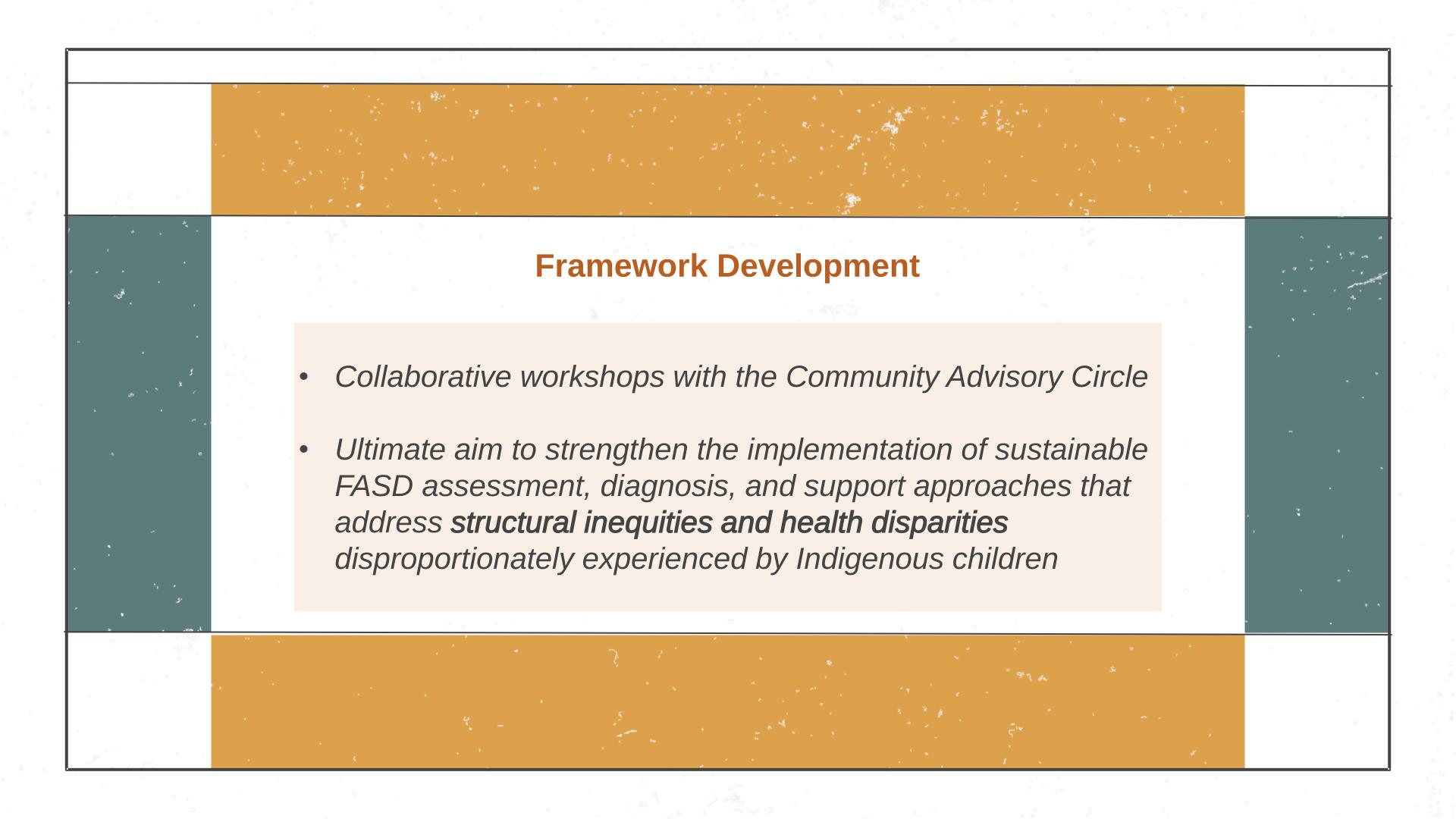
Methods

- Goal is not to engage every Indigenous community in Canada but to ensure as much representation as possible

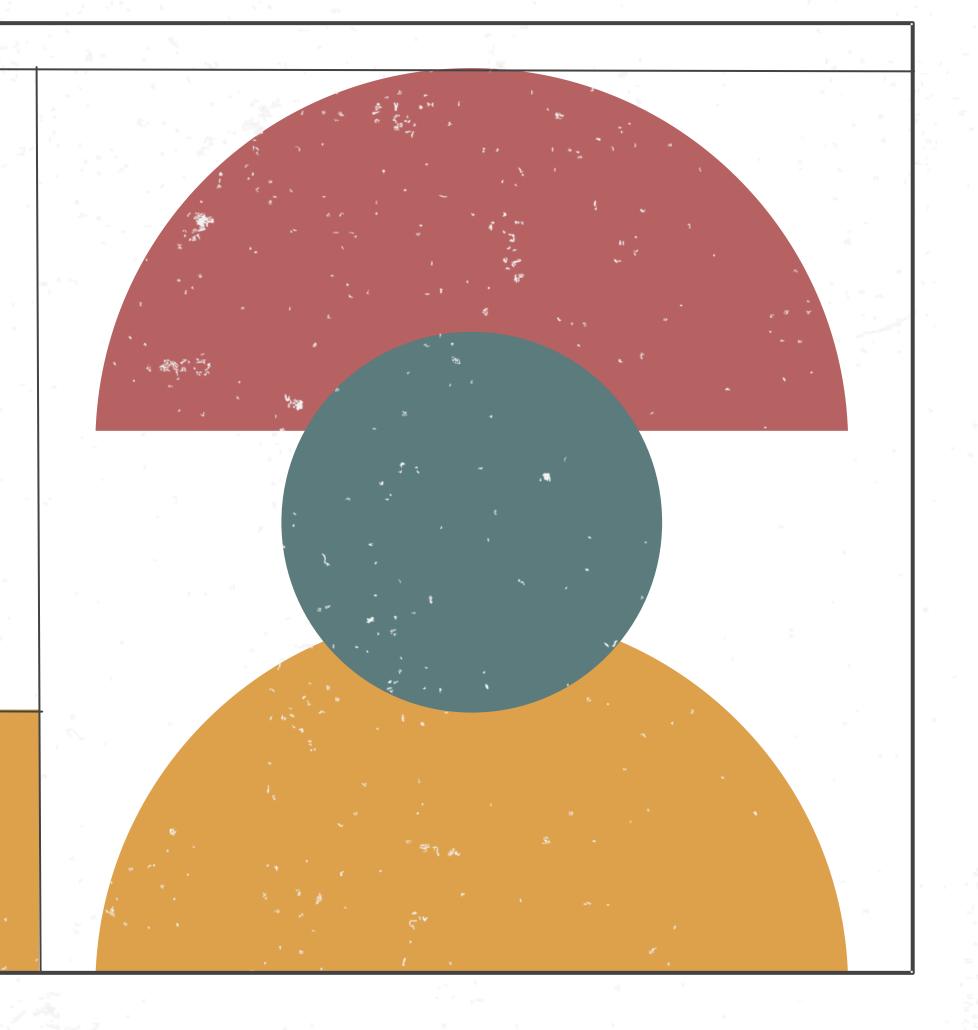

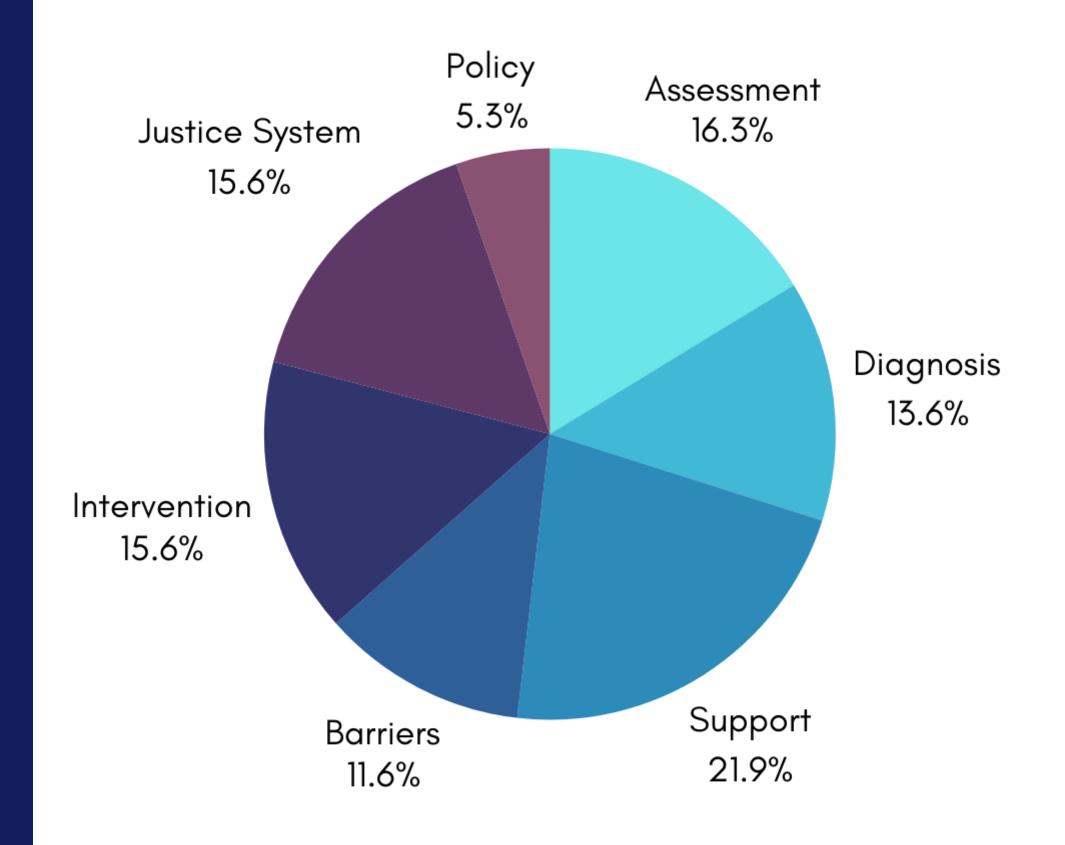

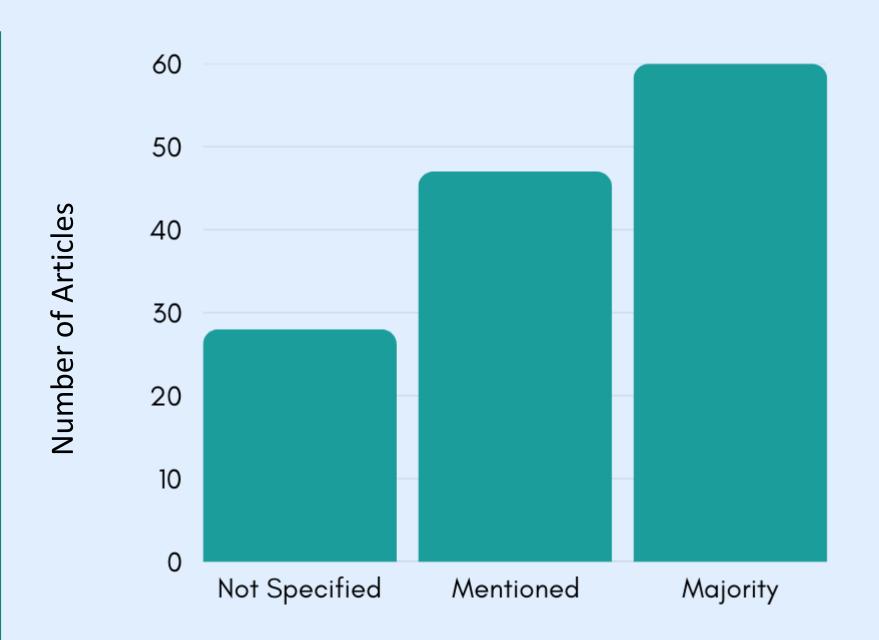

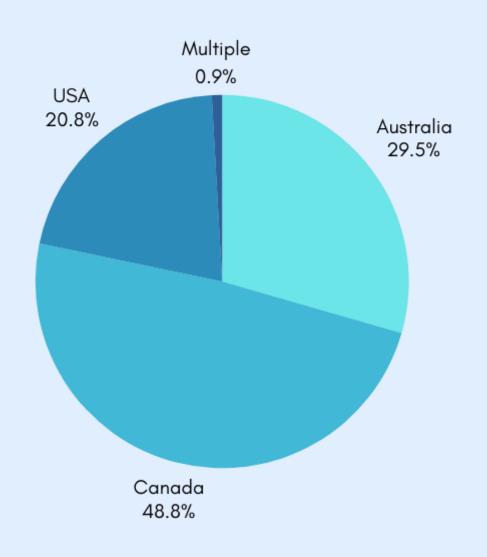
When did artilcles get published?
