



- Health Education and Art for Resiliency Teaching
- Community Based Participatory Research Method
- Two-Tiered Intervention Approach

Student Interventions

- Meditation/ Deep Breathing Routines
- Nutrition Education

- Indigenous children's literature emphasizing cultural values










Pre-Intervention: 6 out of 10 students reported disliking school.

Teacher/Student relationships are correlated with overall classroom climate and student resiliency.





"My family came to see my art. It made me proud to show my Elders"


Families reported enjoying the art show and noted growth in their student's emotional development.

Significance

- It is the school setting that provides the greatest opportunity for students to feel they have autonomy over their health, offering opportunities for self-expression of healthharming behaviors with supportive health education in a safe environment.
- Creating strategies to support the emotional, physical, and psychological needs of children affected by trauma is essential.
- The classroom environment impacts the long-term health and well-being of students, teachers, and the community. (Zajacova & Lawrence, 2018).


